<u>People</u>: We come with a hunger for connection and a thirst for justice.

One: Jesus said, "I am the Bread of Life. You who come to me, shall not hunger; you who listen to me and believe, shall not thirst." People: Together, with all who hunger and thirst, we come to this table to know Christ in the sharing of the bread and the cup. As we gather at Your table, as we listen to Your Word, help us know, Your Presence, let our hearts and minds be stirred.

One: Nourish us with sacred story till we claim it as our own; teach us through this Holy Banquet how to make Love's victory known.

The Great Thanksgiving

Pr. Amy: When we come to this table, having heard what it means, I feel like there is something missing. Jesus shares a Passover feast the day before he is killed for loving too much. And if you've ever been to a Passover feast, it's not a small event, but yet we seem to see Jesus at a table with 12 other people and there is nobody else in the room. When in reality, there are probably servants around making sure everybody is getting the right things and making sure the Passover feast is happening in proper order...there are probably people feeling like they are on the margins...looking in...not really being able to participate...and I have to believe that Jesus sees those people too...not just the 12 at the table with Him...At that meal...a meal that represents the celebration of the liberation of God's people...Jesus takes bread, He offers it to God and gives thanks...and He breaks it...Remembering the brokenness of humanity...Remembering those people around the edges of the room and not just those 12 friends, those that are probably hurting a lot and He says...

This is My body, this is My life and My work with you and for you And I beg you, please, to remember me when you do this again and again and again...Remember the stories and the lessons I taught you when you break this bread and feed each other again and again and again...remember.

And after dinner, Jesus takes the Elijah cup, which is traditionally the cup that is reserved for the Holy One to come, and He doesn't even hold it for Himself...He passes it on...yes, for sure to the Disciples, but maybe it went all the way around the edges of the room...it certainly has made its way here; it's being offered to us here at Alexandria United Methodist Church. Jesus says, this is a cup of a new covenant...not the old covenants simply of law and judgement...but this cup is full of forgiveness and grace and wholeness ("relation is repair")...to believe that you are all worthy! Jesus says, "Drink of it! And remember Me! And remember this ministry we've had because you're going to keep doing it!" For as often as we take this bread, we participate in The Body of the Risen Christ because you and I are the body of the Risen Christ today...even in our brokenness. And whenever we receive this cup, we participate in God's hope for a new community, a new covenantal community of peace, and justice, and love, and reconciliation! Let us pray,

All: Holy and Gracious God, we give thanks for your Beloved Child, Jesus, and everything that He offered and taught. We give thanks that He refused to stay dead. We remember His brokenness when we feel broken and we remember His Resurrection when we feel healed...we remember and so we come together to celebrate love and our diversity in this meal.

One: O God, may Your Spirit come and hover over this table; may Your Grace and our faith dance here over these elements, these simple gifts, that are sacred of bread and cup.

<u>All</u>: Christ has died; Christ has risen; Christ will come again. Thank you God, for this meal, refresh us, as we continue to seek to do Your work in the world, in Jesus' Name, Amen.

One: Pour out Your Spirit on us

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the Kingdom, the Power, and the Glory, forever. Amen.

Bread of Life Cup of Life

United Methodists practice an 'open table', meaning all are welcome – any age, any person – **ALL ARE WELCOME!** The ushers release people in order to prevent congestion and then people make their way to the chancel to receive bread and juice. Feel free to receive Communion standing or kneeling and feel free to respond in the way that feels right to you...when you come to The Table, you may hear the pastor or Communion steward say the words above. Some people like to say "Amen" ~ any loving response, including silence, is a good one. In the Great Thanksgiving, we ask the Holy Spirit to be poured on us and on the gifts of bread and wine we offer. We ask for the Spirit's outpouring to make the bread and wine be for us the body and blood of Christ so we, who receive them, may be for the world the body of Christ redeemed by his blood. We believe God answers this prayer "Yes," and the Spirit does all these things. Christ is really present here, and Christ's presence really changes us.
